

# Lattice Quilt



What a delightful quilt! You don't have to tell anyone how easy it is.

There are three size options here. The first two have the same number of pieced blocks but different border sizes. The larger quilt has more pieced blocks. If you wish your quilt to be still larger, you can add another border.

Fabric selection is pretty painless for this gorgeous quilt! Select a large-scale floral print and then a closely-related background fabric that matches the background in your floral fabric. The two fabrics for the lattice should be a lighter and darker shade of the same color, but you don't want much contrast between them. If they are too dissimilar, they will interrupt the "flow" of the pattern. They should be "almost solid" in pattern, to set off and emphasize the floral print you use for the large squares.

## Equipment:

Sewing Machine in good working order - don't forget extra bobbins, prewound, and new needles.

Rotary Cutting Equipment - your 6" x 24" and 12 1/2" square rulers are most helpful for this project

The Angler®

Thread to blend with your fabrics

Straight pins, Scissors, Seam Ripper

\* There is a large amount of fabric that will be cut off the side of this necessary length. You can probably save a lot of money by purchasing fabric that is double wide - buy the length needed for your quilt, allowing about 8" extra for shrinkage and "backing allowance". The backing needs to be slightly larger than the quilt top. If you prefer to have the backing match the front, however, the extra fabric can be used for pillows or other accessories or added to your fabric collection for another project.

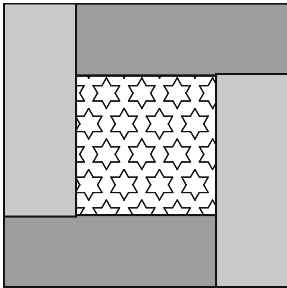
## Sewing the Blocks

All seam allowances are 1/4" unless otherwise noted.

*Twin size* 73" X 84"

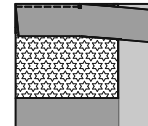
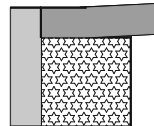
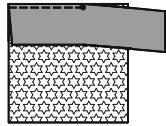
*Full/Queen* 94" X 94"

*Twin/Full* 83" X 94"



Make 20 blocks

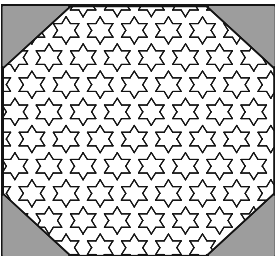
Make 25 blocks



Sew a partial seam as above. You do not need to backstitch. Make all the blocks at one time.

Press open and add the light rectangle as shown. Press seam allowances away from the center block.

Add the other two rectangles in a counter-clockwise order. After the fourth rectangle is sewn in place and pressed outward, align the FIRST rectangle across the unfinished edge and complete the seam.

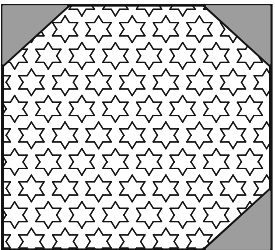


Make 6 with light corners

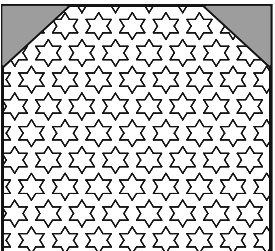

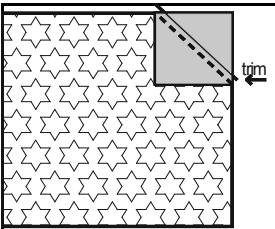

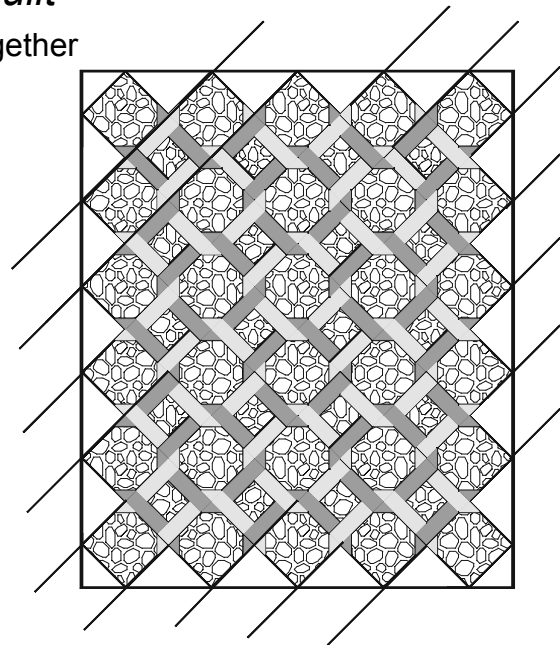
To sew the snowball blocks, position a 2 1/2" square in the corner of the 8 1/2" floral square, having right sides together and raw edges even. Use the Angler® to sew from corner to corner. Trim one or both layers of seam allowance to 1/4" and press the triangle outward.

## Lattice Quilt

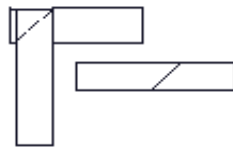
### Setting it Together

This quilt is assembled in diagonal rows as shown here. Pay careful attention to the positioning of the blocks. Be sure to add the background triangles so they "point" the right direction.

Once you have your rows done, build the quilt into two diagonal halves, starting with the shortest (corner) pieces.

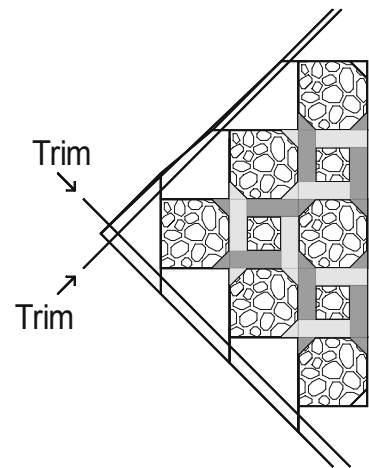


Piecing borders - use a diagonal seam to piece your borders. It's less conspicuous, especially after the quilting.



Press the quilt top and trim the outer triangles so the edges of the top are 1/4" past the corners of the snowball blocks. When you sew the border on, those corners should meet the border; the 1/4" is the seam allowance.

Measure the quilt carefully. Measure both ends and across the middle. Ideally, all those measurements will be the same. Decide what measurement you are going to use and cut your top and bottom borders to that size. Pin the borders to the quilt, matching and pinning at the ends and centers. Sew and press. Measure again for the sides. Cut those borders and sew them on as you did the first two.



Because you have "squared up" your quilt with the inner border, you can sew the outer borders without measuring. Sew them on and trim off the excess.
